INTRODUCTION

The Active After-school Communities (AASC) program has now been running for over six years. During that time the program has liaised with state and national sporting organisations to help local clubs increase their membership base by exposing primary school aged children to their sport.

Two years ago the Australian Sports Commission (ASC) started to prepare specific National Sporting Organisation (NSO) Reports to detail each sport's involvement in the AASC program. These reports combine a statistical analysis as well as a qualitative review of the information, some examples of best practice case studies and any media articles that may have been generated.

The intent of these reports is for NSOs to utilise the information at a national, state and regional level to help develop their sport. I would also encourage NSOs to use the report as a basis for the sport development officers and the AASC's Regional Coordinators to collaborate and plan deliberate strategies for upcoming terms to promote the transition of children, families and new coaches from the AASC program into respective feeder clubs.

Some transition strategies that have proved successful for many sports are as follows:

- Coordinating a 'Come 'n Try Gala Day' at the end of a term.
- Delivering a clinic at selected sites to promote membership to a designated feeder club or participation in a modified junior sport program.
- Coordinating a cluster of schools/Outside School Hours Care Services (OSHCS) to attend the local club and organise a registration or promotional day.
- Coordinating registration days at participating sites.
- Providing promotional material to sites for coaches to distribute to participating children and their families.

Where sports identify specific development objectives within a particular region/state, the AASC program, through its locally based network of regional coordinators, can provide the opportunity to discuss how the program could assist in meeting these outcomes. Some methods to do this include:

- Actively encouraging schools/OSHCS to deliver that sport in a term that precedes the commencement of the sport season, and therefore feed into registration events
- Actively encouraging participation by schools/OSHCS within identified priority areas for growth or expansion of the sport

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

This 2011 Report is again a combination of quantitative and qualitative information related to specific sports. The report looks at where Golf has achieved the greatest success in terms of participation rates and/or growth of AASC program participation.

The following information is included in this report:

- A statistical snapshot of Golf in the AASC program nation-wide, and also by state and region.
- Examples of any targeted partnerships that were developed during 2010.
- A list of organisations and private providers that delivered Golf programs in 2010.
- Any media articles that were generated in relation to the AASC program and Golf.

NATIONAL SNAPSHOT — GOLF IN THE AASC PROGRAM

Delivery of Golf programs

Each semester, schools and OSHCS identify the sports and activities they would like delivered to the children participating within the AASC program. Activities are generally selected in consultation with the children and or the teachers involved, to identify what would be the most suitable program to engage traditionally inactive children.




Figure 1: Number of Golf programs conducted during 2008–2010




Figure 2: Number of Golf programs conducted in each State or Territory in 2010

NATIONAL SNAPSHOT (continued) — GOLF IN THE AASC PROGRAM

Programs are delivered at AASC sites by community coaches who are registered with the ASC. These may be teachers, OSHCS staff, secondary or tertiary students, local club, personnel, private providers or family members.




Figure 3: Breakdown of types of Community Coaches delivering Golf in 2010

Internal Delivery options

In 2010, 29% of community coaches were from schools or OSHCS.

Delivery by sporting representatives

In 2010, representatives of affiliated clubs or associations delivered 30% of all programs. Appendix A shows a list of the organisations that delivered in 2010.

Delivery by private providers

Where affiliated clubs or associations are unable to assist with meeting the demand for delivery, the Regional Coordinator sources private organisations to help extend the reach of the sport. In 2010, private providers were the third most common group of community coaches delivering Golf sessions in the AASC program. Examples of private providers that delivered Golf within the program in 2010 are provided in Appendix B.

Schools, OSHCS coordinators and staff regularly vary the types of sports that are offered to AASC participants.




Figure 4 Number of programs by sport in 2010

AASC GOLF PARTNERSHIPS

Partnership between the AASC and Blackwood Golf Club South Australia

The Blackwood Golf Club (BGC) actively delivers programs at local schools and OSHCS as part of the AASC program. The club will only deliver to schools/OSHCS who commit to attending a 'come and try' day at the BGC some time during the term (the date of this is generally negotiated with the individual site). This ensures the participants are exposed to the club facilities and have the opportunity to play golf on a real course. It also ensures the parents are exposed to the facility when they pick their children up or visit to watch the program in action. A club community coach is always available to discuss the club's junior program to interested parents and answer any questions they may have.

The BGC have recruited four junior girls to the golf program at the club as part of the AASC program.

BUDDING golfer Robyn, 9, is one of 20 Eden Hills Primary students to pick up a club in the hope of becoming the next Karrie Webb or Greg Norman.

The students have started golf sessions at the Blackwood Golf Club on Tuesday nights through the Australian Sports Commission's Active Afterschool Communities initiative, which aims to keep children active to prevent obesity.

"The program allows children who might be put off by contact sports to give golf a go and benefit from the exercise," Blackwood Golf Club junior development chair Bob Riessen said.

Dr Riessen said the club had also formed a 'come and try' junior program, offering keen golfers aged under 21 a discounted three-month membership to try the sport without locking in the commitment of a full membership.

More than 100 school children from Eden and surrounding areas have ensured the future of golf will be strong by partici-pating in the Active After-Communities School program this year.

Many of those children were at Eden Gardens Golf Club on the weekend to take part in the Christmas family day, but the real excitement is for the future of junior golf.

"At the moment we don't really have many juniors competing in events, although there are some working on getting their handicaps for next year," said Eden golf pro Loraine Lambert.

"So this program has worked really well at get-

ting golf into schools to children who may not have seen it or they're into other sports.

"Not all children see golf as a typical sport unless their parents or grandparents want to bring them to the course, so this has been an excel-lent introduction and really successful."

The Active School Communities program is a government initiative and Loraine and fellow Eden pro Lisa Newling seized the opportunity to bring it to the area.
"It took off more than

we expected!'

Loraine said. "This last term we had 110 children in our golf program, which includes Tathra and Bega, so we're really excited."

She added that the response to the program by members at the Eden club has been fantastic.

"They're letting these kids onto the course and are mindful of the fact that these juniors are the future," she said.

The importance of nurturing this youth was highlighted by a drop in membership at the club. Loraine says this was due to a number of factors, but added that the members have been particularly active this year, donating time and money to course improvements including new paths and gardens.

So the Christmas Party on Sunday was a thank you to them and 104 came

along to take part in the event and spread the Christmas cheer, many dressing up to celebrate a

great year.
A four-ball Ambrose event was held with Linda Hallinan, John Hallinan, Tony Nobbs and Gordon Budd taking the prize from runners up Peter Mann, Roger Fletcher, Tony Rogers and Mark Nicholls.

Nearest the Pins for the ladies went to Liz Hepburn (3rd) and Delanie Hutchinson, while Ian Hamdorf (3rd), Adrian Hall (8th), Mick Johnson (10th) and Kevin Jordon (18th) were closest for the men.

When facilities are limited Tasmania's Christian Rainey will deliver his Active After-school Communities (AASC) golf coaching sessions anywhere he can – even on the beach!

The Hobart-based coach believes lack of facilities should be no barrier to children learning and enjoying golf.

Apart from coaching children from Sandy Bay Infant School on Nutgrove Beach, Christian frequently conducts AASC sessions on school ovals using modified equipment. When possible he does conduct his program at local golf courses.

Since becoming an integral member of the AASC coaching team in 2005, the Tasmanian 5 Star Community Coach Award winner has delivered more than 500 golf sessions at 36 sites throughout Tasmania.

The number and diversity of locations is testament not only to the popularity of Christian's sessions, but to his commitment to travelling through the state, assisting at gala days and attending all major AASC campaign events.



AASC Tasmania South 3 Regional Coordinator, Aaron Roberts, said Christian's approach was not just about giving children a hit with clubs or getting them onto a golf course, it was about providing a critical pathway to junior golf development.

'Christian's willing to travel great distances including to rural sites to deliver golf programs,' Aaron said.

'He's conducted regular programs at sites up to two hours away from Hobart and has even organised gala events on a Sunday where children in the community are invited to participate and receive specialised coaching.

'He is often asked to return to many of our sites because of his fantastic attitude when delivering activities. He is a truly valued member of the AASC coaching team and has been a great ambassador for golf.'


Northern Suburbs AASC Participants Give Golf a Go (E News WA Term 3)




Lakelands CC coach, Tristan Ponchard, gives the event participants a putting demonstration


Australian Capital Territory and New South Wales




